

# Winter Weather and Border Crossings: A Complete Preparation Guide

How to prepare for winter weather conditions at border crossings

Winter weather can shut down crossing points entirely. The difference between arriving safely and being stranded at a closed crossing often comes down to one factor: preparation.

## The Winter Border Reality

### Winter conditions that affect border crossings:

- Blizzards close highways leading to border crossings without warning
- Ice storms transform familiar routes into treacherous obstacle courses
- Extreme cold creates mechanical issues in vehicles during long waits
- Limited visibility forces staff to slow or suspend processing entirely
- Reduced staffing during severe storms means fewer lanes and longer waits

## Monitor Multiple Weather Sources

Your preparation must begin days before departure. Relying on a single weather app is insufficient for winter border crossing planning.

### What to monitor:

- National weather services for both countries you'll be traveling between
- Regional forecasts for the specific border crossing location
- Highway condition reports for travel feasibility
- Winter storm watches and warnings that might affect your timeline
- Social media groups specific to your crossing point for real-time updates

Start monitoring at least three days before your planned crossing, and check multiple times daily as your departure approaches.

## Planning Your Timeline

### Build flexibility into your schedule:

- Add 2-3 hours buffer to normal crossing time estimates in winter
- Identify overnight accommodation options near the crossing
- Decide in advance what weather conditions cancel the trip
- Book refundable accommodations when possible during winter travel
- Set SafelyArrived check-in with a realistic expected arrival window

## Identify Alternate Routes and Crossings

Never travel to a border crossing with only one route option.

### Plan your backup options:

- Research alternate border crossings within reasonable distance
- Understand hours of operation for each alternate crossing
- Map multiple routes to both primary and alternate crossings
- Identify major highways vs. secondary roads (secondary cleared last)
- Save offline maps on your phone before departing

## Vehicle Winter Preparation

### Before you leave:

- Full tank of gas — you may idle for hours in cold weather
- Check antifreeze levels and windshield washer fluid
- Ensure windshield wipers and defrosters work properly
- Winter tires or chains if traveling through mountain passes
- Verify battery health — cold weather reduces battery performance

### Emergency kit for your vehicle:

- Blankets, warm clothing, water, and non-perishable snacks
- Flashlight, first aid kit, and ice scraper
- Jumper cables or portable jump starter
- Sand or kitty litter for traction if stuck

## When Weather Turns Severe

### Decision framework:

- Check official road and border closure notifications before departing
- Call ahead to verify crossing is open
- If storm warnings are active — seriously consider postponing
- A delayed crossing is always better than being stranded
- Notify family via SafelyArrived of any changes to your crossing plan

### If you get stuck waiting:

- Stay with your vehicle — it's your best shelter
- Run engine sparingly to conserve fuel and crack a window slightly
- Clear exhaust pipe periodically if snow is accumulating
- Signal for help by tying a bright cloth to your antenna or door
